Material must be taken from a Tennessee Williams Play

Time: 10 minutes of performance time only

Set up time: Each scene is allowed up to 5 minutes of set-up time

Strike time: Each scene is allowed up to 5 minutes of strike time

Props: No furniture will be provided. Any props, furniture, or set up pieces must be provided by the competitor and must be simple enough to set up & strike within the allotted time. **TIME WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.** Judges will be looking for actors to make the dramatic sense of the scene, so keep props simple.

Beginning and Ending of Scene:

1. Once stage is set, one person (does not have to be in acting group) may introduce the scene as follows:
2. State school's name, assigned group number, and play from which material is taken
3. At the end of the scene, one person (does not have to be in acting group) must restate school name, number
4. Please avoid sitting, kneeling, or lying on the stage floor for an extended period since this may impair vision of judges; All material must be memorized and rehearsed to fit the allotted time frame.
